History of FBLA

FBLA was founded by Professor Hamden L. Forkner at Columbia University in 1937 with the goal of uniting business clubs in the nation's high schools and colleges. It wasn't until 1942 that the first chapters were chartered - Johnson City, TN; St. Albans, WV, and the first collegiate chapter at the University of Northern Iowa. It's not until five years later, in 1947, that the first state chapter was chartered in Iowa! The Alumni division was added in 1979, followed by the Middle School division in 1994. From 1973 to today, FBLA has only had 4 individuals serve as the association's President & CEO. Today, FBLA stands tall with over 230,000 members and countless events to choose from. No matter what students are most interested in, there is bound to be an event that can help them when entering their career field.

CTE Advocacy

On odd years, when the North Dakota Legislature is in session, ND CTE and the student organizations, including FBLA, typically go to the Capitol to promote our organizations and values.
